Robert H. Ivy Society— The Early Years





Early Years

Born in Southport England May 21,1881

Schooled in England.

Emigrated to U.S. at age 17.

Enrolled in the School of Dentistry and graduated in 1902.

Too young to graduate with his class in 1901.

Attended University of PA Medical School 1903-1907.

Resident Physician from 1907-1910 at the Episcopal Hospital of Philadelphia.

1910, He opened Oral and Plastic Surgery Practice in Philadelphia.

Specialty did not exist at the time.

Assistant to his uncle Matthew H. Cryer who was a Professor of Oral Surgery at the School of Dentistry at University of Pennsylvania.

Interest in Urology, worked with Dr. Benjamin A. Thomas.

Philadelphia Polyclinic (graduate hospital)

Co-authored a text in Urology.

He was a Pathologist and Bacteriologist at West Philadelphia Hospital for Women.

Helped developed Wasserman Test for Syphilis.

Military

Commissioned in 1917 as a Captain of the Army Medical Corps.

Assistant to Vilray P. Blair- Office of Surgeon General.

He was promoted to Major in France.

Consultant in Maxillofacial Surgery Hospital Centers of Vichy and Clermont where he treated facial and jaw injuries.

March of 1919 Returned to the U.S.

In charge of Maxillofacial Surgery at Walter Reed Hospital.

November 1919, he was discharged as Lieutenant Colonel.

In 1920 he was called to active duty.

He was a representative for the U.S. Army at the Inter Allied Surgical Conference where he discussed bone grafts.

In 1924 he was elevated to Colonel in the Army Medical Corps Reserve up until WWII making frequent trips to the Walter Reed Hospital.

Served 2 terms of active duty at Army Medical Centers in Washington DC.

Instructor to Army Surgeons treating facial injuries under Division of Plastic and Maxillofacial Surgery.

1940-1945 Frequent meetings in DC for above.

1945 Civilian Consultant to Surgeon General with Jerome Webster of New York. Together they inspected all the Plastic Surgery Centers in the United States.

Taught course for Army officers at Army Medical Center and University of Pennsylvania.

Co-Authored The Manual of Plastic and Maxillofacial Surgery for Military Surgeons.

Practiced Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery in Philadelphia between wars.

Consultant to mining companies in Scranton, PA.

Repaired facial and jaw injuries of miners.

Given Certificate of Appreciation from the War Department.

Buried with full Military Honors

1919 Opened a practice in Philadelphia.

***1919 Appointed Professor of Clinical Maxillofacial Surgery at the School of Dentistry at the University of Pennsylvania.**

1920 Professor of Maxillofacial Surgery at the Graduate School of Medicine.

Became Chief of Maxillofacial Surgery.

1937 Professor of Maxillofacial Surgery, University of Pennsylvania.

***1943 Became a Professor of Plastic Surgery at the Graduate Hospital and at the University of Pennsylvania.**

1948 Professor of Maxillofacial Surgery at University of Pennsylvania School of Dentistry.

1950-1951 Retired from being a Professor of Plastic Surgery at the Graduate School of Medicine and became a Professor Emeritus.

1950-1951 Retired from being a Professor of Maxillofacial Surgery from the School of Dentistry.

***Dr. Ivy was the first ever Professor of Plastic Surgery at any University.**

He became a Professor Emeritus.

Professor Emeritus at three schools.

Trained 34 Plastic Surgeons.



There has always been a controversy as to whether Dr. Royster or Dr. Morani was the original person to mention the idea of a plastic surgery society. The May 8th, 1954, letter from Dr. Ivy to Dr. Morani is the first known written correspondence about the possibility of a society where Dr. Ivy responds to a communication from Dr. Morani. This fact caused Dr. Ivy to refer to Dr. Morani as the “mother of the society”



Herewith is a ~~short~~ list of people who might be interested. I don't know whether the Society should include people like Dr. March or Dr. Travaskis in Allentown, but I feel sure they would be interested. - also there is Dr. Robert L. Hardin in Harrisburg, who is not too far away. Captain Wickstrom has one or two men like Dr. Silver working with him at the Naval Hospital, who at least should be invited to meetings as long as they are stationed in Philadelphia. I have not included Dr. Curtis' name, as he has retired, but I think it would be a gracious thing to make him an honorary member. There are probably others that would be suggested, whom I have not mentioned.

Please let me know your reactions in this. I have talked with Pete Randall and Curt Lamp and they would certainly like to form such a group, and if you would like to meet with a group of us, we should indeed like to plan such a society.

Dear Henry:

I received your letter regarding the formation of a local Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery. I am very much in favor of this idea, and am willing to act in an advisory or figure-head capacity if it is so desired, but would prefer to leave the details to the more active men. About two weeks ago I received a similar letter from Dr. Alma Morani, and replied to the same effect. I suggest that you get together with her so that there will be no misunderstandings or working at cross-purposes. I furnished Dr. Morani a list of several people in this vicinity who might be interested, and there were about twenty names. I also suggested that the organization might be called the Delaware Valley (USA) Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, so that such men as Marcks at Allentown, Harding at Harrisburg and your man at Wilmington might feel free to come in. There are one or two men in Philadelphia who might want to join, who some may think are on the borderline. I think we should be a little careful about who is admitted and who is left out, and that membership should be limited to those prepared to do general plastic surgery.

I have written to Kathryn Stephenson, who I believe is active in some of the local California Societies, asking her to send me a copy of their constitution and by-laws, which might give us some helpful hints as to membership requirements, dues, etc. If she sends me the information I will pass it on to you immediately.

I think prestige might be added to the organization by electing to honorary membership the chief surgeon of each of the five schools of medicine and the Graduate School of Medicine in Philadelphia.

Should you decide to have an organization meeting soon, I will be glad to be present, to learn what is going on and help in starting the movement.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF SOCIETY OF PLASTIC SURGEONS

Know All Men By These Presents:

That we, the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a nonprofit corporation as follows:

1. The name of the corporation is:
2. The specific and primary purposes for which this corporation is formed are to promote the high ideals of ethical plastic surgery and to maintain and promote a study of the scientific problems of plastic surgery.
3. This corporation is organized pursuant to the General Nonprofit Corporation Law of the State of California. This corporation is not organized for pecuniary gain or profit. No part of the net earnings of this corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member or office or to any individual. The property of this corporation is irrevocably dedicated to charitable, scientific, and hospital purposes and upon the liquidation, dissolution or abandonment of this corporation will not inure to the benefit of any private person, but shall be distributed to a fund, foundation or corporation organized and operated for charitable, scientific or hospital purposes and duly exempted from federal and state income, estate, inheritance and gift taxes, or to the United States of America, or the State of California, or to any political subdivision of either thereof, as shall be designated by the Executive Council of this corporation.
4. The County in this State where the principal office for the transaction of the business of this corporation is located is the City and County of San Francisco.

SOCIETY OF PLASTIC SURGEONS BY-LAWS

1. Membership

Membership shall be by invitation. Election shall be by secret written ballot submitted to all regular members. Three negative votes shall disqualify a candidate and his name may not be resubmitted for two years. The minimum requirement for membership is Board certification by the American Board of Plastic Surgery or eligibility therefore, or, in special instances, certification by the American Board of Surgery or the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery or eligibility therefor.

Member
In the event a person is elected to Regular Membership on the basis of Board Eligibility, and, if after three years following fulfillment of Board Requirements, he or she does not take and pass said examination, he or she shall be automatically dropped from this organization.

Membership shall be of two types: REGULAR and ASSOCIATE.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Regularly licensed physicians of plastic and reconstructive surgery, fulfilling the requirements as provided in the By-laws, may be admitted to membership in this Society.

ARTICLE IV

Organization

Section 1. The Society shall function through:

1. The Annual Membership Meeting.
2. The Executive Council

Section 2. The supreme governing power of this Society shall be vested in the Annual Meeting. In the interim between the meetings, the Executive Council shall represent the Society, subject to the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE V

Executive Council

The management and control of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in the Executive Council. This Council shall function as provided in the By-laws of the Society and shall consist of President, Vice-president, Secretary, and Treasurer and two members at large. The Executive Council shall direct and supervise all affairs of the Society, act as a nominating committee for officers and for new members and act in all other capacities as shall be necessary. The Executive Council shall meet as necessary and always on the evening before the day of the annual meeting of the members.



CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this Society shall be "The Robert H. Ivy Society"

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The purpose for which this Society is formed shall be:

1. To promote and further medical and surgical research pertaining to the study and treatment of congenital and acquired deformities.
2. To keep the medical profession informed of the scientific progress in plastic and reconstructive surgery.
3. To stress the great social, economic and psychological importance of this surgical specialty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Regularly licensed physicians of plastic and reconstructive surgery, fulfilling the requirements as provided in the By-laws, may be admitted to membership in this Society.

ARTICLE IV

Organization

Section 1. The Society shall function through:

1. The Annual Membership Meeting.
2. The Executive Council

Section 2. The supreme governing power of this Society shall be vested in the annual meeting. In the interim between the meetings, the Executive Council shall represent the Society, subject to the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE V

Executive Council

The management and control of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in the Executive Council. This Council shall function as provided in the By-laws of the Society and shall consist of President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer and two members at large. The Executive Council shall direct and supervise all affairs of the Society, act as a nominating committee for officers and for new members and act in all other capacities as shall be necessary. The Executive Council shall meet as necessary and always on the evening before the day of the annual meeting of the members.

ARTICLE VI

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended as follows:

1. An amendment may be proposed by any one of the following:

An active member.

Any officer or chairman of a standing committee.

The Executive Council

A committee authorized to do so by the President.

2. Proposed amendments shall be mailed to the membership at least thirty days prior to the voting thereon.
3. Amendments to this Constitution shall be made only at the Annual Meeting or at a Special Meeting called for that purpose.
4. Amendments to this Constitution shall be placed before the Annual Meeting or Special Meeting called for that purpose only after they have been considered by the Executive Committee. Upon approval of this Committee, amendments shall be enacted only upon the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the active members present and voting at such meetings.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Membership Classes

Section 1. There shall be three classes of membership:

- a. Active
- b. Candidate
- c. Honorary

Active

Section 2. Active members shall be surgeons of high moral standing and professional attainments who are actively engaged in the practice of plastic and reconstructive surgery or a subdivision thereof. They shall be citizens of the United States of America. This class of membership shall be limited to ~~50 hundred~~.

At least seventy-five percent of the active membership shall be surgeons whose practice is exclusively plastic and reconstructive surgery. Not more than twenty-five percent shall be surgeons who merit recognition in general plastic surgery or subdivision thereof, but whose practice is not exclusively limited to plastic and reconstructive surgery.

Admission to Membership

Section 3. Active members shall be admitted only upon invitation of the Society. Candidates to be elected to active membership in the Society may be proposed for membership therein by written proposal of any active member submitted to the President or Secretary, who shall refer such proposal to the Membership Committee. Upon favorable action by the Membership Committee and the Executive Committee, the name of the proposed active member shall be submitted to the vote of the members of the Society at an Annual or Special Meeting. The proposed member shall be elected to membership by an affirmative vote of at least four-fifths of the active members present and voting.

New Members

Section 4. A candidate shall become an active member upon election to membership and upon payment of the annual dues.

Rights

Section 5. Active members shall have the right to vote at all meetings of the membership and be eligible to hold office in the Society.

Honorary

Section 9. Honorary membership shall be conferred upon physicians and scientists whom the Society desires to honor because they have achieved exceptional eminence and have made substantial contributions to the advancement of plastic and reconstructive surgery. Names for this membership may be presented to the Executive Committee by any member. Upon recommendation by this Committee to the Society, the candidate must receive an unanimous vote of approval. Honorary members shall enjoy all the privileges of the Society except the right to hold office and vote. No dues will be required of Honorary members.

Candidates Group

Section 11. This Group shall be composed of physicians who have satisfactorily completed approved formal training but who have not completed five years of practice in the specialty of plastic and reconstructive surgery. Admission to this Group is by invitation only. A three-fourths vote of approval at the Annual Meeting shall be required for admission to this Group. They shall have the privilege of attending meetings, of presenting papers, and of participating in discussion. Such candidates pay no dues and have no voting power, but they must assume the registration fee when attending meetings. Acceptance into the Candidates Group does not imply election into membership of the Society.

ARTICLE II

Resignation, Suspension, or Expulsion of Members

Resignation

Section 1. Any member may withdraw from the Society after fulfilling all obligations and giving written notice of such intention to the Secretary. This notice shall be presented to the Executive Committee at the first meeting

following its receipt. The Executive Committee shall have the power to accept or reject the resignation.

Suspension or Expulsion

Section 2. A member of the Society may be suspended or expelled for any of the following reasons:

Cause

Violation of any provision of the Constitution or By-laws of this Society.

Conduct prejudicial to the best interest of the Society.

Failure to pay dues.

Failure of an active member to attend three successive Annual Meetings of the membership without excuse found to be reasonable by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE III

Officers

Names

Section 1. The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and two members at large called Trustees.

Term of Office

Section 2. The officers of this Society shall be elected by secret written ballot at time of annual May meeting. The term of office of President and Vice-President shall be one year. Term of office of Secretary and Treasurer shall be three years. A majority of votes of members present at the Annual Meeting shall be necessary to elect officers. The elected officers shall serve until their successors have been elected or appointed.

President

Section 3. The President shall preside at the meetings of the membership of the Society, the Executive Council, and the Executive Committee. He shall be a member ex officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. He shall appoint with the approval of the Executive Committee, as many sub-committees or special committees as may be necessary to carry out the functions of the Society, which sub-committees or special committees shall work in conjunction with and be responsible to the standing committees to which they may be assigned by the President.

Vice President

Section 5. In case of absence of the President, or of his inability from any cause to act, or at the request of the President, the Vice President shall perform the duties of the President. He shall succeed the President in the event of his death, resignation, removal, incapacity, or refusal to perform any proper act.

Secretary

Section 6. The Secretary shall perform the duties generally pertaining to that office. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to give notice of and attend all meetings of the Society and keep a record of such meetings; to conduct all correspondence; and to carry into execution all orders, votes, and resolutions not otherwise committed. He shall keep a roster of the members of the Society together with such data with respect to the members as may be of interest to the Society.

Treasurer

Section 7. The Treasurer shall collect and receive all of the dues and other funds accruing to the Society. He shall be accountable therefor to the Executive Council and the Society at such times as he shall be ordered by either body to present a statement of accounts. He shall keep proper books, records, and accounts which shall be at all times open for examination by the Executive Committee, the Executive Council, or their approved representatives. He shall deposit the funds of the Society in the Society's name and in such depositories as shall be designated or approved by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV

Executive Council

Section 1. The Executive Council shall consist of six members, four officers of the Society and two members at large. The latter shall be elected at each Annual Meeting for a term of three years. Any member who has been President of the Society will automatically become a member of the Executive Committee upon his retirement as President.

Duties

Section 2. The Executive Council shall have the power to hold meetings at such times and places as they may think proper; and to devise and carry into execution such measures as they may deem proper and expedient to promote the objects of the Society and to best protect the interests and welfare of the members.

Meetings

Section 3. The annual ^{meeting} meeting of the Executive Council shall be held at such time and place as the members thereof shall determine. Notice of such meeting, signed by the Secretary, shall be mailed to the last recorded address of each member of the Executive Council at least ten days before the time appointed for the meeting. The President of the Society may, when he deems necessary, or the Secretary shall, at the request in writing of one member of the Council, issue a call for a special meeting of the Council, and only five days notice shall be required for such special meeting. ~~Resolutions of the Council shall be passed by a majority of the members present.~~

Quorum

Section 4. Three members of the Executive Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.



ARTICLE V

Meetings

Section 1. The Annual Meeting shall be held during the month of May in each year. The other three meetings of the year will be in October, January and March. It is proposed meeting the first Tuesday of each aforementioned months. Time and location of such meetings are determined by the Executive Council.

Section 2. The Annual meetings shall be for the purpose of election of officers and Executive Council, the election of new members, for receiving annual reports of officers and committees. The Annual Meeting may also be held for the presentation of scientific communications or for social purposes. Notice of the Annual Meeting shall be mailed to each member thirty days before meeting time. *Meeting for 1952 will be held - Oct 6, Jan 4, March 1 and May 3 1952*

Guests

Section 3. Any member desiring to have a guest attend the Annual Meeting must so notify the Secretary at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting so that the Secretary may extend an invitation to said guest.

Order of Procedure

Section 4. At the business session of the Annual Meeting, the order of procedure shall be as follows:

Reading of the Minutes of the last Annual Business Meeting.
Annual Reports of the officers and standing committees.
Amendments to the Constitution and By-laws.
Election of officers
Election of new members.
Acceptance of additions to the Candidates Group.
Unfinished and new business.
Adjournment.

Special Meetings

Section 5. Special Meetings of the membership of the Society shall be called by the President upon the written request of ten active members of the Society or of two members of the Executive Council who shall specify in such request the particular business for which the said meeting is to be called. Notice for all Special Meetings shall be mailed not less than fifteen days before the time appointed for such meeting.

Quorum

Section 6. A quorum of fifteen members entitled to vote shall be necessary for the transaction of business at either the Annual Meeting or a Special Meeting. Only active members shall be entitled to vote.

Vote

Section 7. All questions, the manner of deciding which is not otherwise described in the By-laws, shall be decided by a majority vote of the active members present.



ARTICLE VI

Dues

Fiscal Year

Section 1. The fiscal year shall be from October first to September thirtieth.

Entrance Fee

Section 2. An entrance fee of \$25 shall be required of each active member upon his election.

Dues

Section 3. The annual dues of active members shall be \$10.

Payment of Dues

Section 4. The annual dues of active members are payable on the first day of January. No active member shall be entitled to the rights and privileges of membership after he shall have been suspended for nonpayment of the current dues. Dues shall be suspended for members on temporary active duty with the armed forces. Only active members are responsible for dues and fees of this Society.

ARTICLE VII

Committees

Section 1. The following committees shall function in the Society:

Membership Committee
Program Committee

Section 2. Additional committees may be appointed by the President from time to time as deemed necessary.

Membership Committee

Section 3. This Committee shall consist of four members appointed by the President of the Society. It shall be the duty of the Membership Committee to investigate and report on all proposals for members received by it. Before reporting favorably on any application for membership, the Committee shall be satisfied by proof deemed to be sufficient by it that the applicant has complied with the laws of his state or country relative to the practice of medicine, and that such applicant is of good moral and professional character, standing, and reputation, and that his admission would serve the best interests of the Society. The Membership Committee shall submit the data assembled by it together with its recommendation for or against the admission of the proposed member, to the Executive Committee which shall pass on it. If the Executive Committee shall pass favorably upon the proposed member, his name shall be submitted to the vote of the active membership.

Ivy Constitution



Program Committee

Section 4. The Program Committee shall consist of five members appointed by the President of the Society. It shall encourage research work pertaining to plastic and reconstructive surgery and allied subjects. It shall supervise the program arrangement for scientific meetings and make suggestions to the Executive Committee.

Section 5. This Committee should endeavor to prepare the program approximately one year in advance so that all meetings can be carefully planned and location of meetings decided.

ARTICLE VIII

Elections

At the Business Session of the Annual Meeting of the membership of the Society, there shall be an election by ballot for the officers of the Society. A majority vote of a quorum present and voting shall be necessary to constitute an election.

ARTICLE IX

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, REVISED, shall govern the Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these By-laws.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

The By-laws may be amended only at the Annual Meetings of the membership of the Society or at Special Membership Meetings called for that purpose. An amendment may be submitted by any one of the following:

An active member

Any officer or chairman of a standing committee.

The executive committee.

A committee authorized to do so by the President.

The Manstein Award is given for the best overall resident paper at the Annual Meeting. The Manstein Award was approved in 2008 and first presented in 2009.


